

Right at the core of Ireland's Hidden Heartlands is the utter gem of Lough Derg, where adventure trails meet legendary tales.


Lough Derg provides the perfect backdrop for plenty of adventure and a great big dose of chill.



Bringing it all together are the miles of breath-taking Blueway trails which bring you right to the core of what makes this area so special. Discover this majestic lake and savour idyllic views of tree-lined shores, island-dotted bays, mountain top views, tranquil quays, colourful villages and marvellous wildlife on Ireland's third-largest lake. The Lough Derg Blueway has 21 individual paddling trails along its entire 180km shoreline, as well as various walking and cycling trails. You can hike, bike, paddle or sail; all you have to do is choose your way.



Putter about on our courses

Whether you're a wannabe pro or just enjoy a putter about, you can tee off at a range of golf courses around Lough Derg. Our courses aren't just about the golf – they get you out into the beautiful natural settings of Lough Derg. From the acres of parkland at Nenagh and Ennis to the mountainous background at Roscrea; the natural forest park of Portumna to the panoramic views and natural water features of East Clare Golf Club, we have you covered.



For a simple little trad session in the pub, a village fete or a full weekend arts festival, we always have something on the go to suit your pace. Everynight of the week, there's live music around the lake, from Shortt's in Feakle which has been playing live music every Thursday night for over half a century to the spirited Sunday sessions at renowned spots like the Washerwoman and Larkins, so you can move to the rhythm every night of the week.






Get hooked on Lough Derg

Getting back to your roots

Did your cousin's cousin's cousin come from Clare or is your paternal Grandpa a native of Nenagh? You can't visit Lough Derg without putting down some roots so if you want to find out if you have any links to this much loved part of Ireland, now is your chance. Start off with the Nenagh Genealogy Centre in Tipperary, Ennis Genealogy Centre or Woodford Heritage Centre in East Galway either of which might give you much more to take home than you expected!



And the rest is history

With such a variety of culture and heritage, it's no surprise that Lough Derg has such a great selection of museums and galleries for daytime mooching and catching up with your history.

Start off at the Thomas McDonagh Museum which has lot of interesting snippets and artefacts about the Tipperary poet and 1916 Easter Rising leader. The McDonagh family have an impressive history and include a nun, a singer/songwriter, a Government Minister and a founder of the BBC Symphony Orchestra. Or you can get up to date with one of Ireland's first hydroelectric schemes at Ardnacrusha Power Station. Almost a century old, you can find out how it was built and get right to the source of how it operates. If art is more your thing, catch up with The Bridge Creative Art Centre which has some great reflections of the area, fabulous local arts and crafts and regular exhibitions on the go.



Accommodation





The stunning 17th Century Portumna Castle sits right on the shore of Lough Derg with an unbeatable view of the great lake. The ground floor is open to the public with an exhibition telling the story of the Castle owners and how the building has been restored over the years. You can choose a 45-minute walking tour or stroll around the grounds, walled garden and Castle marina at your own pace.

Portumna Workhouse operated for 70 years before workhouses were abolished in 1921. The building was revived in 2011 as an education, conservation and tourism project. A tour of the building tells the story of how workhouses ran, showcases some of the original furniture and explains the workhouse system. The building is also the base for the Tourist Information Point.

Lough Derg has plenty of historic buildings to explore, many of them in great condition and easily accessible. Nenagh Castle is a 13th Century, beautifully restored, high tower. An internal stone spiral staircase leads visitors 101 steps to the top of the 100 feet building which has perfect views of the thriving town of Nenagh.







Push your way through an adventure trail or paddle your own path along Lough Derg's calm waters, discover unexpected historical wonders, like the intriguing Brian Boru's fort, and let the exploration unfold.



Lough Derg has a huge variety of trails for all levels of fitness, ability or mood. You can meander along a forest path or paddle along the lake with all the time in the world. Or you might ramp up the challenge and hike or bike an adventure trail to the top of the mountain to take in the best views of the lake. It's over to you...

The beautiful village of Garrykennedy hosts a range of short, looped walks through the forest which are ideal for families and those who want an easy pace. The loops are a lovely way to see the forest - just make sure you look out for the mini fairy doors as you go.

Embrace the dense forested landscape with incredible views over Lough Derg on this challenging looped walk. Traversing hillsides and uplands over 7.12km, the Crag Wood Walk trailhead also connects to the East Clare Way. Taking around two hours to complete, the Ballycuggaran Crag Wood Walk follows a pleasant mix of forest road, forest track and a minor road.



Practising a **Leave No Trace** ethic is very simple: enjoy exploring but make sure you leave no trace of your visit by leaving behind litter, disturbing vegetation or polluting the water. It's that simple.

- Be Considerate of Others
- Respect Farm Animals and Wildlife
- Travel and Camp on Durable Ground
- 5. Leave What You Find
- 6. Dispose of Waste Properly
- 7 Minimise the Effects of Fire
